



FINANCIAL SESSIONS



PROGRAM FEATURES

- As part of their academics, the German students got the opportunity to attend the 13th International Conference on Sustainable Waste Management and Circular Economy, a combined effort between Somaiya Vidyavihar University and DHBW University. Prof. Dirk Hartel delivered a paper titled "The Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Supply Chain Management," which provided useful insights to the conference.
- The DHBW Stuttgart students, accompanied by KJSIM students, were given a complete tour of the Somaiya campus during their visit. This includes visiting modern infrastructure facilities such as BioRiidl, the Engineering College, S K Somaiya College, and the Somaiya Sports Academy. The German students were particularly impressed with the Somaiya Sports Academy's world-class facilities and actively participated in sports such as soccer, tennis, badminton and cricket with the SVU team. Dr Brijesh Singh of the K J Somaiya Institute of Dharma Studies led a Yoga practice for German delegations part of their cultural immersion.

The discussion covered various aspects, including bilateral trade, the presence of German companies in India, and the importance of exchange programs between India and Germany.

INDUSTRIAL VISIT

- As part of their industrial visit, the German students had the opportunity to explore various facets of the Indian business landscape. Their tour to The Times of India Printing Unit at Airoli provided insights into advanced printing processes. Bennett Coleman and Co. Ltd. Plant Head Indrajit Sen guided them through the end-to-end printing process of The Times of India newspaper. This includes information on printing quality, colour choices, plate production, and newspaper printing improvements.
- A tour of the Bombay Stock Exchange (BSE) provided students with an opportunity to learn about the stock exchange's operations, with Dr V Aditya Srinivas from the BSE Brokers' Forum providing useful insights into topics such as market performance, investments, and portfolio management. The students engaged in a comparative analysis of the Indian and German Stock Exchange Markets.
- The industrial exploration continued with a trip to Taloja's TechNova Imaging Systems Pvt. Ltd., where the students learned about imaging technologies. Furthermore, an engagement with the team at Tata Consumer Pvt. Ltd. (TCPL) gave them insights into the Tata Consumer Products supply chain. This experience provided learners with an understanding of why Tata is regarded as one of India's premier firms.

EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING PROJECT

- German students worked together with KJSIM students as part of their experiential learning project comparing transport systems in India and Germany. The collaborative teams travelled through India's transport system, focusing on monorail, metro, local trains, and road transport (including auto-rickshaws and buses) in Mumbai. After their research, the students presented their findings in class.
- In addition to their academic pursuits, the students immersed themselves in Mumbai's colourful culture. hey visited iconic locations such as Marine Drive, explored the renowned Kitab Khana bookstore, indulged in shopping in South Bombay and Bandra, and savoured the diverse array of Indian cuisine. The students also took the opportunity to explore the rich cultural and architectural heritage of India by visiting the Elephanta Caves. This holistic experience provided them with a deeper understanding of Indian culture and its unique blend of tradition and modernity.







PROGRAM ITINERARY

- The itinerary for the DHBW students' visit to KJSIM in Mumbai was meticulously designed to offer a comprehensive experience. Upon arrival on 27 November 2023 at Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport, DHBW students were greeted with warmth and taken to the Somaiya Vidyavihar University campus, where accommodations were arranged in Sandipani and Maitrieyi hostels for men and women, respectively.
- The first day commenced with a campus tour, followed by breakfast and a visit to The Times of India Printing Unit in Airoli. The students returned to campus for dinner in the evening. The second day began with breakfast and a yoga session, followed by various sessions on topics like Indian culture, supply chain management, and cross-cultural management. The day included an industry visit to the Bombay Stock Exchange and sightseeing at Kitabkhana, Gateway of India, and Marine Drive.
- Students attended the 13th International Conference on Sustainable Waste Management and Circular Economy on the third day, which included technical tracks and keynote speakers. A transportation experiential learning project, and an industry tour at the Technova Imaging Systems Pvt Ltd, Taloja. The fifth day featured a tour of Elephanta Cave, a visit to Somaiya Head Office and Tata Consumer Pvt Ltd, and followed by a dinner.
- Students were allowed to explore freely on the sixth day. It involved shopping, a buffet lunch at Global Fushion Restaurant, and a friendly sporting event. On the seventh day of their stay, the students boarded Flight LX155 to Zurich, bringing the immersion program to an end.






